Volkswagen – We drive football

Football sponsorship has a long tradition at Volkswagen. 1. Opta Facts



VfL Wolfsburg – 1. FFC Turbine Potsdam 28th May 2022



- This will be the 42nd final in the history of the Women's DFB-Pokal. It will take place at Cologne's RheinEnergieStadion for the 13th season in a row. Only Berlin's Olympiastadion has hosted more finals (25 from 1985 to 2009).
- VfL Wolfsburg have reached the final for the ninth time only Eintracht Frankfurt have appeared at this stage more often (14x, incl. 13x as 1. FFC Frankfurt). Turbine Potsdam are in the final for the eighth time in club history and for the first time since 2014/15 (lost 3-0 to Wolfsburg back then).
- Reigning champions VfL Wolfsburg lifted the title for the eighth time last season, beating Eintracht Frankfurt 1-0 (a.e.t.). Only Frankfurt have won the Women's DFB-Pokal more often (9x, always as 1. FFC Frankfurt). Potsdam have won it on three occasions, most recently in 2005/06 (2-0 against SGE).
- Wolfsburg have won the Women's DFB-Pokal in each of the last seven seasons the longest such run in the competition's history.
- VfL Wolfsburg and Turbine Potsdam will face off to see who will lift the title for the third time in the competition's history. Only Potsdam and Frankfurt have met more often in the cup final (4x, SGE were still playing as 1. FFC Frankfurt at the time).
- VfL Wolfsburg did the double over Potsdam in the Women's Bundesliga this season, winning 3-0 in both matches. Ewa Pajor had a hand in all three of VfL's goals at home (2 goals, 1 assist), while Tabea Waßmuth scored a brace in the reverse fixture. The Wolves have scored at least three goals in each of their last six league matches against Potsdam (22 goals in total), while Turbine have managed just three.
- Wolfsburg celebrated their seventh league title this season. Since the Women's Bundesliga switched to a single-division format, no team has been crowned champions more often (Eintracht have also won it 7 times as 1. FFC Frankfurt). VfL are the first team to win all 11 of their matches in the second half of a season during this timeframe.
- Turbine Potsdam ended 2021/22 in fourth place with 43 points, their best return in the Women's Bundesliga since 2017/18 (45 back then). That season was also the last in which Potsdam recorded as many wins as they did in 2021/22 (13).
- Selina Cerci is Potsdam's top goalscorer in both the Pokal (5 goals) and the league (13) this season, but will
 miss the final due to injury. Wolfsburg's Svenja Huth and Jill Roord have each netted a club-high three goals
 in the cup in 2021/22. Their top goalscorer in the league, Tabea Waßmuth (13 goals), has found the back of
 the net just once in the Pokal this term.
- Turbine head coach Sofian Chahed took charge of the club ahead of the 2020/21 season. He has lost all four of his competitive games against VfL Wolfsburg since then (all in the Women's Bundesliga). Chahed hasn't faced any other side as often while at Potsdam and lost every meeting.



2. Analysis

A classic cup final

For the third time in the competition's history, VfL Wolfsburg and Turbine Potsdam will face off to see who will lift the title. Only Potsdam and Eintracht Frankfurt have met more often in the Pokal final (4x, SGE were still playing as 1. FFC Frankfurt).

- The first time these two sides met in the final of the Women's DFB-Pokal was in 2012/13. Martina Müller scored a brace to put Wolfsburg ahead, before Conny Pohlers added a third. Potsdam were able to cut the deficit thanks to goals from Lisa Evans and Yuki Ogimi, but were unable to complete the comeback, as the Wolves lifted the title for the first time in their history.
- The 2014/15 final also saw Wolfsburg take a three-goal lead against Potsdam. Martina Müller again netted a brace, with Alex Popp adding a third in the 71st minute as VfL ran out 3-0 winners. Wolfsburg have gone on to win all six of the following cup finals the longest such run in the competition's history.

Wolfsburg back in the final again

VfL Wolfsburg have been the dominant side in the Women's Bundesliga over the last decade (won 7 of the last 10 league titles since 2012/13), to go along with their imposing form in the cup:

The Wolves have reached the final for the ninth time, something only Eintracht Frankfurt have achieved more
often (14x, incl. 13x as 1. FFC Frankfurt). They have been crowned champions in each of their first eight
appearances in the final, and could equal the all-time record of nine trophies currently held by SGE (all as
1. FFC Frankfurt).

 Wolfsburg have won the Women's DFB-Pokal in each of the last seven seasons – the longest such run of any team in the competition's 42-year history.

The Wolves go into the final on an impressive run of form, having made history in the second half of the Women's Bundesliga season, which they ended as champions for the seventh time:

- VfL are the first team in history to have won all 11 of their matches in the second half of the season, since the Women's Bundesliga switched to a single-division format.
- Since the foundation of a one-division Women's Bundesliga, only three teams have ever scored more goals in the second half of a campaign than Wolfsburg in 2021/22 (52). The last team to manage this was Eintracht Frankfurt in 2010/11 (58 goals as 1. FFC).





A long wait for another final

Turbine Potsdam are one of the most well-established sides in women's football in Germany. In recent years, however, they have had to watch as other clubs have surpassed them in the standings, especially VfL Wolfsburg. Sofian Chahed's team have fought their way back, however, and could end the season as DFB-Pokal champions:

- Potsdam have reached the final of the Women's DFB-Pokal for the eighth time, something only Wolfsburg, Sportfreunde Siegen (both 9, Sportfreunde as TSV Siegen) and Eintracht Frankfurt (14, incl. 13 as 1. FFC Frankfurt) have managed more often.
- Turbine have lost each of their last four appearances in the cup final, with their last two defeats both coming against VfL Wolfsburg.
- Potsdam last won the Women's DFB-Pokal in 2005/06, lifting the trophy for the third season in a row at the time. Two late goals from Isabel Kerschowski (79') and Petra Wimbersky (82') saw them beat 1. FFC Frankfurt 2-0.
- Kerschowski returned to Potsdam this season, having spent five seasons at Bayer 04 Leverkusen and four at VfL Wolfsburg in between. She won two Women's Bundesliga titles and lifted the Pokal four times with the Wolves. In 2021/22, the striker has featured in 17 league and four cup matches. She scored a penalty to bring Potsdam level in their semi-final against Leverkusen (1-1), a game which they eventually won in a shootout.

Despite a strong league campaign this season, Potsdam narrowly missed out on qualifying for Europe:

• Turbine ended the season with 43 points, their best return since 2017/18 (45 back then). A 5-0 thumping at the hands of FC Bayern on the final day of the season saw them miss out on a spot in the top three, which would have been enough to secure Champions League qualification.

Birgit Prinz – the queen of women's football

10 years ago, the German FA honoured Birgit Prinz with a testimonial match to mark her retirement from professional football. Germany's record appearance maker (214 caps) and record goalscorer (128) also enjoyed her share of success in the DFB-Pokal:

- Birgit Prinz delivered one of her best performances in the Women's DFB-Pokal on 11th May 2002, scoring a hat-trick for 1. FFC Frankfurt as they beat Hamburger SV 5-0 in the final. It was the fourth of Frankfurt's five consecutive Pokal triumphs at the time.
- Prinz scored another important goal in the final in 2001. 1. FFC Frankfurt were 1-0 down at half-time against Flaesheim-Hillen before Prinz equalised in the 48th minute to help kick-start a comeback (2-1 win).
- Prinz's last Pokal triumph came 11 years ago, against Turbine Potsdam in Cologne. Although she didn't score in the final, she found the back of the net three times on the way there. One player who did get on the scoresheet that day could likely be a key figure in this year's final: Svenja Huth. Back then, the current Wolfsburg midfielder put Frankfurt 1-0 up in an eventual 2-1 win.

VfL Wolfsburg cruised through the first four rounds, knocking out three Bundesliga sides in the process:

- They faced MSV Duisburg in the second round, a long-time presence in the Bundesliga and a three-time Pokal champion. Duisburg took the lead through Savanah Uveges, before the Wolves turned the game around with two first-half goals from Svenja Huth (43') and Lena Oberdorf (44') to win 3-1.
- Wolfsburg then faced a fellow Bundesliga side (the first of three) in the round of 16. Dominique Janssen put them ahead early on (12') against Freiburg as they went on to win 3-0. In the next round against SC Sand (relegated from the Bundesliga this season), the Wolves went 2-0 up inside 16 minutes before cruising to a 7-0 victory.
- VfL's opponents in the semi-final were FC Bayern, who had a number of players not fully fit after a number of Covid cases a few weeks before. Jovana Damnjanovic's equaliser (1-1) was then cancelled out by two goals for the Wolves (3-1).

Potsdam's run to the final

Potsdam faced two Bundesliga sides on their way to the final, making short work of their opponents from lower leagues:

- Potsdam easily saw off Hannover 96 in the second round, thanks to a hat-trick from Selina Cerci (will miss the final due to injury). Turbine then needed second-half goals from Marie-Therese Höbinger (53') and Cerci (88') to knock out Köln in the round of 16.
- The quarterfinals saw Potsdam come up against underdogs Henstedt-Ulzburg, as they went 5-0 up inside the opening half an hour (7-0 win).
- In the semis, Leverkusen opened the scoring from the spot through Dina Blagojevic in the 66th minute, before former Wolfsburg player Isabel Kerschowski equalised via another penalty in the 83rd minute. The match then went all the way to a shootout, where Potsdam were able to keep their nerves.








6. Last Competitive Match VfL Wolfsburg






